It symbolizes politics: we all look at the same artwork or issue, but each of us sees something different. Our political opinions, our walks of life and of course also our age, determine the way we perceive a political issue. The artist calls upon us to put ourselves in the other one's shoes.

Put differently: imagine and incorporate the opinion of your opponent.

Colleagues, I wish you all the best in the coming days.

And when you find that the debate is polarized and it is difficult to find common ground: think of this work of art and place yourself in the other one's shoes.
